Perhaps if we are familiar with this story, it seems all very predictable. It seems to be just the typical story, all too often reflected down through history, of the continuing suppression of the underprivileged. A very political narrative could be read into this – and the story could be bent to support a "liberation theology" outlook. We need to re-read some of the lead-up to this confrontation, though. We will find that *Pharaoh* was not the only one not properly listening.
