Matthew 14:1-12 Death in service

Matthew digs out some recent history as he continues to present his evidence to help us answer the question "What sort of man is this?" (8:27). Curiously (or perversely!) the people of Jesus' own hometown dismiss him (13:54-57), but Jesus' fame has reached the relatively distant palace of Herod Antipas, "tetrarch" (a rank technically somewhat lower than "king") of the area – but a man haunted (rightly!) by guilt over his treatment of John the Baptist.

> John's repeated statement (4)

So was John right or unwise (or both) to have repeated his open condemnation of Herod's and Herodias' relationship?

Is Matthew insisting that Herodias *remains* "his brother Philip's wife" (3), despite Roman law saying otherwise?

> Herod - guilt-ridden

Is Herod feeling "good guilt"?

Herod's guilt gives rise to fear and gives way to superstition. What other superstitions (particularly religious ones) arise from guilt? Is your conscience typically over- or under-sensitive?

What's the difference between Satan accusing and the Holy Spirit convicting?

Herodias - spiteful

Why might Herodias have been so sensitive and spiteful?
How often do we come across this kind of calculated hostility to the Gospel nowadays?

Salome - naive

The name Salome is not given in the Bible, but in the historian Josephus' later account. We should probably consider that she is in early teens – and therefore at least in part a victim herself of this horrendous plot.

But are we all victims, to some extent (2 Timothy 2:24-26)?
